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A Word from one of our Ministers

Friends,

I write this early one Sunday morning in June, and as God has formed this message in my mind, I have been very emotional. We are in a process of discernment as to the Church's situation in the next quarter century. I came to visit you for the very first time just over 3 years ago, and I was introduced to key people, shown the building site which would become my home, and I heard some of the stories of the 3 churches that would become Cornerstone. I listened to the hopes shared as well as the challenges, and I went back north and reflected. I came here in August 2021 with some anxieties about the magnitude of the calling.

When I arrived, I told you something of my story, but stories continue to unfold: I didn't know then how my story would continue to unfold though, but God continues to be in it with me whatever happens — my story is part of God's story, and God's story is even more a part of my story.

Early this year, someone I love phoned me out of the blue on a Sunday morning and told me that she was seeing someone: a girl. She was trusting me with her heart and tentatively asking me what I would do with it. I exclaimed with joy that she felt able to trust me and I continue to hold that precious gift with deep tenderness, whilst her girlfriend is also becoming well loved. The only reason that I have wept over them is that people still have to live in a society where they are judged for the feelings of their hearts. My story has not always been this one, and stories can change: God is the author and finisher of our story, and what God calls us to do is to sit with it as it unfolds in a place of her grace and my repentance.

Gavin and I have been trying very hard not to influence the direction of the Discerning Prayer Journey work, but I couldn't not speak out about inclusion: as the Circuit's Equality, Diversity and Inclusivity (EDI) Officer, I have been prompted this morning to explore this message: it isn't an easy one.

My vision for Cornerstone is that the church, which is the people of God, would remember and embrace Jesus' way of disturbing society's tribal instincts so that we become radically inclusive, to the extent that we can eliminate "they" and "them" from our vocabulary, because "we" are all here: those experiencing poverty, marginalised, refugee, gay, black, divorced, differently-abled in every way, migrant, young, old, trans, neurodiverse, and everyone else! A vision that our love for Jesus and for each other would hold us together more tightly than any difference could separate us, and that the beauty and fullness of the Kingdom might be found and known at Cornerstone. That we embrace our place as children of God at the feet of the Saviour and know that there is a place for everyone. Ultimately, that the family of God is as broad as God creates it to be, and not limited by our own understanding. Bob Boyce spoke profoundly at St Andrews on the 9th June when he was preaching about Mark 3: "Jesus lived and died to expand our definition of love and of family." Read that twice.

To be so radically inclusive is an act of surrender to God: this is God's church and we are God's people. As church, we like rules and boundaries and we struggle with the chaos of humanity but we serve a God who breaks down barriers, we follow a man who was a Jewish rabbi AND a rule-breaker, and he shows us time and again that the Kingdom breaks in when we are least expecting it. My hopes and dreams as an EDI Officer are that Cornerstone is a place of inclusion, of diversity and where the full life of the entire people of God is explored and celebrated. We can become a church which truly looks outwards. Cornerstone might be called to surrender what history and tradition have shaped it to expect, and to step out, as Abraham did, into a new future, one of opportunity and hope, founded in the example of Jesus Christ, and inspired by his great commandments to love one another. No ifs, no buts, and no boundaries. Let our story be one of love. Just love.

DISCERNING PRAYER JOURNEY NEWS

Our Discerning Prayer Journey began in April as we sought to focus our vision for the next 25 years. Here's where we have got to and what happens next.

We began the journey by inviting everyone to join in thinking about what our Silver Jubilee might look like. Where would we be as a church? Who would be there? There were some struggles with the task – 25 years is after all a long way ahead! We've stuck with it, though, because we believe it helps us focus forward rather than just thinking about ourselves and here and now.

Along with our personal and group conversations we have planned three Discerning Prayer Journey events. The first took place on the 26th May after church at London Road. 27 people participated and, together, we explored who we are and why we are.

I led an opening reflection using a story about a Lifeboat Station that went through various cycles in its commitment to saving lives along a dangerous coast-line where shipwrecks were frequent. Each time the Station grew and developed and then became more concerned about protecting their investment in what became a somewhat exclusive club, more concerned about the clubhouse than the bedraggled victims of the sea. All this has resulted in a number of lifeboat stations along that coast but not a lot of lifesaving going on as a result.

We invited everyone to go off for a period of quiet reflection and prayer, giving them three questions to ponder:

Think back over the past 24 years what has changed:

In the world round about us;

In our local community;

In the Church.

What did the lifesaving station story say to you?

What is our purpose? What is ours to do?

The period of reflection was followed by group discussion in smaller groups before recording the feedback from those discussions. The limits of space prevent me from detailing the feedback but as I look at the question about our purpose I note the following:

To be a vehicle for God's love seeking justice for all

Grow followers of Jesus;

To be welcoming and inclusive

Face the door, not the altar

To create spaces where people can encounter Jesus.

As I read those I am encouraged! Inherently, we do know who we are and why we are – we just need to discover, with growing confidence, how to **be** who we are!

That's the task of our second event on the 7th July. Please do join us at Partridge Green.

One I want to emphasise, we all need to try and participate in each of the **Discerning Prayer Journey** events. They're **NOT** just for the Chapel they're happening in! It is as we spend time listening, reflecting and sharing together, that we together, discern God's voice in the midst of the challenges we are facing.

Please do try to attend *all*, or as many as possible, of the remaining events to develop the conversation *together*.

Included with this edition of Outlook you will find the handout and questions along with the full feedback responses. Please do use these if you did not attend the first event to prepare yourself for the next one.

Slavery and the slave trade

Slavery has been around ever since humans first picked up weapons and fought each other. It was institutionalised as the first civilisations emerged, such as the Sumerian in Mesopotamia, where it is first noted as an established practice as far back as

3500BC. It was widespread in the ancient world throughout Europe, Asia, the Middle East and Africa, although its prevalence reduced across Europe in the Middle Ages.

However, during the centuries of Christian / Muslim warfare, both sides were responsible for enslaving their captives. Islamic law of the time approved of the enslavement of non-Muslims, so from the 7th to 20th century slaves were trafficked across mainly western and central Asia, northern and eastern Africa, India and Europe.

The transatlantic slave trade really started in the 16th century, with Portuguese merchants purchasing captured Africans in return for commodities such as guns, gunpowder and cloth, and transporting them to colonies in the Americas. The demand drove local wars to enslave yet more Africans, but also slaves from India and the New World, to create the local workforce. As the requirement for slaves grew, so did the range of people and nations involved in their transportation, especially the British. Much of the wealth created in the $18^{\rm th}-19^{\rm th}$ centuries in Western economies was based on the slave trade from various parts of the world.

Ultimately, as we know, the transatlantic slave trade was abolished in the 18th – 19th century by European and American governments. Interestingly, the first country to fully outlaw slavery was France in 1315, although it was used later in their colonies. The first (and so far only) country to self-liberate from slavery is Haiti, a former French colony, in early 19th century. Japan outlawed chattel slavery in 1590, although as is well-known the Japanese prisoner-of-war camps used forced labour (effectively slavery) in WWII.

But what about nowadays? It remains an international problem, although no country admits to adopting it. As of 2019, an estimated 25 – 40 million people across the world were enslaved, mostly in Asia it is believed. 25% of these were children That total figure is equivalent to the entire population of Austria, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands together! Slavery in the 21st century continues,

and is estimated to generate \$150billion in annual profits for those slavers. In 2016, sex trafficking and sexual slavery were estimated to account for around 5million people, 300,000 of them in developed economies and the EU.

And what is being done about it? Because it is such a secret trade, outright policing is notoriously difficult. Many governments have passed laws against the many forms of slavery, but policing it is a highly complex, difficult task. One effort, the A21 Campaign, Abolishing Injustice in the 21st Century, is trying to address human trafficking by providing potential victims with the education and information on how to reduce their likelihood of being trafficked, by teaching how to reduce their vulnerability.

Numerous international organizations partnered to create an anti-human trafficking Giving Day to raise awareness and funds on July, 30th 2017. This is the day designated by the United Nations as the World Day against Trafficking in Persons. So remember July 30th as the day annually designated for moving against slavery in all its forms.



EXCITING NEW PARISH NURSE VACANCY (Part Time) DORKING CHRISTIAN CENTRE

The Dorking Christian Centre are looking to employ a NMC Registered Nurse in a part-time position to lead their new Parish Nursing Service.

This creative and compassionate service is provided in partnership with Parish Nursing Ministries UK and aims to support local people in the physical and mental health challenges they face and improve wellbeing within the Dorking area.

The Dorking Christian Centre is a very busy Methodist run community facility proving a home to a Warm Space, a Foodbank, a Community Wardrobe and a Community Fridge. It hosts many counselling and addiction services and offers a café and various daily activities to address social isolation, to help those with dementia and to improve mental health.

The Parish Nurse's role will be:

- -guide and journey alongside those facing chronic health conditions
- -provide aid to those facing the final stages of life, to their families and caregivers as well as offer bereavement support
- -build positive relationships with local health and social care providers
- -offer an advocacy role that supports people in their access to health services
- -consider gaps within the Centre's provision and potentially offer new opportunities to improve wellbeing
- -provide spiritual care, as appropriate

Current registration with the Nursing Midwifery Council is essential and support for revalidation is provided.

Hours: 5 per week with the flexibility to work over 2 days


Salary: £18 per hour plus holidays and expenses

Bible Month July 2024 Genesis: God's invitation to partnership

On the Sundays in July, we will be exploring the book of Genesis across all three chapels.

Please be aware that there will be roadworks happening in London Road for resurfacing and repairing of ironworks etc. This will take place for three days, weather permitting, from the 2nd July.


