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#### A Word from one of our Ministers

Dear Friends,

Happy First Birthday Cornerstone! Indeed, here we are one year into our journey together as Cornerstone Methodist Church. What a year it has been!

It began with the District Chair setting us on our way by asking us a question: So what is in a name? He reminded us, that as our name suggests, we have a solid foundation upon which to

build a new faith community, even Christ himself! Our risen Lord and Saviour.

In this affirmation we have set forth on our journey and, I believe, the work is well begun. Just a cursory glance at our Annual Report – which only actually covered six months of our journey – tells us so! We are seeking to embrace a greater narrative, a bigger story, than just one of our Chapels on their own.

In many ways we are shaping a new narrative.

- of engagement with the community through the Community Fridge at London Road and St Andrew's
- of offering friendship and fellowship through Tea & Chat, Friday & Wednesday Café,
   Movie Mondays and more
- of sharing resources and enabling new opportunities through technology
- of building new pastoral networks and sustaining that important aspect of our work in the wider church family
- of enabling engagement with families in Horsham and Partridge Green through Messy Church
- of an ecumenical endeavour on The Green in Partridge Green at Pentecost

#### To name but a few!

Of course, setting out on such an adventure is not without its own challenges. Challenges, however, are merely opportunities in a different disguise. As we consider some of the challenges, maybe we ought to ask ourselves what might be the opportunity hidden in this disguise? And we have been trying to do just that.

The Discerning Prayer Journey (DPJ) was just such an opportunity for us to decipher the opportunity hidden in two specific challenges.

Firstly, the realisation that if we are seeking to write the narrative I have listed above, we need companions to help us shape it because we are not enough on our own to do so. There is a vulnerability there that has the potential to hinder our progress.

Secondly, there is the conundrum of just what to do with buildings that need a significant investment of financial resources just to make them good never mind fit for purpose in our new narrative.

Now, I am not here going to attempt to unpack the conversation that has unfolded over the course of our three DPJ events. That will come because the conversation has been good and is rich with the seeds of opportunity to reshape our narrative. All I want to say at this point is simply this:

What is your, what is my picture of God?

- Is God the stingy miser who reluctantly parts with mere morsels at the end of our bitter pleading?
- Is God the efficient manager who doles out just enough for what we require?
- Or, is God the bountiful supplier, the reckless benefactor, the exuberant giver of more than we could ever imagine to meet even the smallest need?

Go to the Scriptures. No, go to these specific Scriptures – they're not the only ones, but they're a beginning. Matthew 13, The Parable of the Sower and John 6, the Feeding of the 5,000. Read them again and tell me if God is not the bountiful supplier, the reckless benefactor, the exuberant giver of more than we could ever imagine! Let that be the narrative that shapes our story afresh.

On the cover of this edition of Outlook you'll find a photo of the cover of this year's Connexional Prayer Handbook. It flows from Isaiah's call through the ages to "learn to do right; seek justice and defend the oppressed" (Isaiah 1:17a, NIV). And Mary's song of praise, the 'Magnificat' (Luke 1:46-55). "...announce God's kingdom which "brings down the powerful from their thrones and lifts up the lowly."

It is a call to engage in God's mission and be part of that transformation. To be a Church that is called to become an increasingly evangelistic, inclusive and justice-seeking Church. I grew up in just such a Church in South Africa. Indeed, Praise and Protest, although they weren't the specific watchwords, were, nevertheless, fundamental to the vision that shaped a Church in its response to the need. The same need lies at the gate here, now and our President and Vice President have placed an amazing resource at our disposal. My prayer is that we use it accordingly.

Lastly, Angela and I would like to thank you all for your love and care. We are indeed glad to be able to tell you your prayers are being answered. Whereas when we arrived, Brian's circumstances were dire, now they are filled with hope and healing. He suffered a significant brain infection that led to a stroke which was complicated by their inability to respond immediately owing to his circumstances. He's come through that and is beginning a journey of recovery that will take some time. Just what the end of that road looks like we don't yet know. However, we do know who to trust. Please do continue to keep us in your prayers.



# What do Pastoral Visitors do? What is it like to be a Pastoral Visitor?

Perhaps you think they deliver the monthly **Outlook**. Well they do do that for those who need a paper copy but their main rôle is to offer pastoral care to those on their pastoral list. Everyone on Cornerstone's roll is allocated a Pastoral Visitor. A number of them have put a few words together about what it means to them to be a Pastoral Visitor.

"For me, being a pastoral visitor is to be like a port of call, a path to the Church family. It is the Church being vigilant about the person's welfare, whilst respecting their privacy. A pastoral visitor has the task of walking alongside the person in good and bad times. I am not a counsellor or a good friend but aim at being, for that person, a reminder of God's loving care."

"Over many years of being a Pastoral Visitor at London Road I have had the privilege of entering into many interesting conversations with the folk that I visited. Sadly some are no longer with us but the memories still linger. I hope that they were able to gain as much from me as I did from them. Just one small pleasure from being a P.V."

"I feel it is very important to keep in contact with people especially ones who are unable to get to church and could easily feel forgotten."

"I have spent some lovely mornings taking a lady out for coffee and learning about her family and her childhood. It can be very lonely when you don't see many people. I think I get as much enjoyment from our outings as she does. I feel very privileged to have the opportunity to share with her."

"It is a privilege to be a Pastoral Visitor and an important responsibility within the Church family.

It is a way I can share the love of God by listening to and building a relationship with different people. I love getting to know the people on my list and happy that I can be of help when they need a listening ear, prayer or more practical help. Whilst part of the role is to support others in their Faith journey, I do find that my own faith is strengthened by engaging with others and seeing their faith during difficult times.

As part of a team, I know that support and advice is always available.

I am not perfect as a Pastoral Visitor, and sometimes there is a lot going on but I have found the role to be very worthwhile."

We are looking for more Pastoral Visitors so if you would like to participate in this important work then please talk with Gavin or Sarah. Sue Randell, our Pastoral Visitors' Secretary, can tell you more.

#### **GAMBIA**

**Methodist World Mission** has just celebrated 200 years of Missionary work and witness in one of the coastal countries of North West Africa. In 1818, the British Governor of The Gambia invited the Wesleyan Methodist Church Society (*WMCS*) to send British Missionaries to live among the many liberated slaves who had been deported from countries where they had been enslaved. Thousands of disorientated people were deposited in North West African countries.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church Society responded positively to this challenge which involved a comprehensive programme for rehabilitation to include education, practical training in survival skills like food production and medical care. Central to all this was Christian teaching and fellowship, and the need to train Leaders and Pastors as churches were built.

In 1821, their first ordained Ministers were sent from Britain to Gambia to start this challenging assignment. Sadly, some of these early pioneers died from malaria or other African diseases for which there was no medication. Others bravely took their places and two years later, in 1823, the place now known as Janjanbureh, in the central river region was identified as a suitable settlement for liberated slaves.

The first Wesleyan Methodist Church was established in 1824 by Rev. John Morgan who also opened a school and a training workshop teaching skills to enable communities to eventually become self-supporting.

Within 14 years of their arrival, the WMCS had overseen the building of several more churches and schools at other settlements around Gambia. Education remained central for many years along with the growth of vibrant churches. Medical missionary work was introduced in 1920 with emphasis in care for mothers and young children. In 1960, medical work was revitalised when a Research Centre was built which benefitted much greater areas of need with a

wide range of services and health care to thousands of people. Child vaccinations and maternal well-being contributed to greater stability in family life. All of this was underpinned by the solid foundation laid by the early missionaries who had demonstrated the sacrificial love and grace of Jesus in practical and compassionate ways.

Care for the environment began to take place when sustainable farming methods were taught and areas that had suffered from deforestation were replanted with trees and soil structures improved.

Membership of the Methodist Church in Gambia has increased through the pastoral care and evangelism of ordained and lay preachers and there is a commitment to persevere in spite of the growing influence of other faith groups.

In 2009, the Methodist Church in Gambia gained autonomy and the current Bishop Barrie Manga has vowed to continue the primary mission objectives of evangelism, education, healthcare, and sustainable agriculture. The bishop reports that the Methodist Church is recognised for their enormous contribution and many leading figures employed in politics, economics and civil service were educated in Methodist Schools and have remained members of the Churches.

The Longman Memorial school in Kombo West Circuit opened in 1999 with 5 Nursery class children, meeting in the Church building. Today, this school has 810 pupils with 32 staff. They have a link partnership with Methodist Churches in the U.K. who have funded most of the classroom building work in the Church compound. It is necessary to charge fees but that does not prevent parents from choosing this clear Christian education. The Head Teacher, Mrs Eglah Sharpe-Smith and her staff maintain an ecumenical and inter-faith approach demonstrating the love and acceptance of God for all people. They are now hoping and praying for funds to provide computers and include IT training in their curriculum., Sharron and John Harbottle are involved with the Churches medical and education ministry. On DAY 2 in the Prayer Handbook, John and Sharron have recently asked for us to join them in prayer that God will continue to give them health and strength as they support the Churches as they disciple young people and lead all members into deeper faith so that they may all have joy and hope in the Lord.

Bishop Manga leads us in a prayer of thanks including

"We thank God for the many people who feel the love of God through the varied ministries of the Church, and we pray for strength to carry on the Master's work and renewed zeal to speak the truth to the nation of Gambia "

**John Moon** [ a previous member of the London Road community ed.] was taken to the Queen Alexandra hospital in Portsmouth on Saturday 10 August . The staff at Wellesley Court ( where John and Margaret live )called the Ambulance to attend at 6:00 am on Saturday 10 August.

A week ago his podiatrist gave him a gold star for the healing of his right foot which had developed an open wound and healed up. It seems that the healing had 'shut in' a deeper infection that has now become a problem.

As with all infections what appears minor and unimportant to those considerable younger can become critical if left untreated in the very elderly. I have laboured this fact to both parents to the receipt of shrugs from both. I imagine there will be at least a week in the acute wards whilst the infection is attended to and stabilised. Then a move to a general ward.

In the back of my mind I can see plans for a further amputation being considered. I hope it does not come to that but given father's track record I could see it giving the better medium term improvement to a 'normal' quality of life.



#### **Disability Awareness Day**

Fred and I had a novel experience on a very crowded Tube train last month; two young men got up and offered us their seats! I was very grateful as I had been struggling not to

bash into people, clutching the strap hangers as the train hurtled around the bends.

I assume it was our evidently visible advanced years that prompted this kind gesture, rather than any perception of disability. But it is true that we rely on our eyes when we consider if someone is disabled. The visual accompaniments of wheelchairs, guide dog, sticks, walkers etc can point to this. However as the signs on the back of some seats in railway carriages remind us, not all disabilities are visible.

Jesus did not need visual symbols to tell him if a person needed healing, whether their disability was physical or mental. His compassion and healing were available to all.

For us Disability Awareness Day should perhaps be a reminder that we can't go wrong if we do as Jesus did and treat everyone we meet with consideration and kindness.






