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# A Word from one of our Ministers

Dear Friends

By the time you read this, we will be heading into October, that month of darkness as we anticipate the changing of the clocks, and the evenings become ever darker. For those of us who enjoy the summer evenings, it comes as a bit of a sadness as the days begin to shorten. For those of us who have lived in Scotland, and even the north of England, we already notice that

the "long" summer evenings are not as long as they are further north!

However, when the clocks change, there are good things to look forward to — cosy winter evenings, mornings that dawn bright, crisp and fresh, that certain commemoration of our Saviour's birth (I'm not saying "that" word quite yet!), the joy of the winter lights and the anticipation of the New Year celebrations — and the fact that we can begin to look forward to Spring again, buying seeds for the garden and to longer days!

We live in a cycle of life that has existed as long as humanity has been around: those of us who have been around the sun more than a few times have an understanding of the nature of this repetition! Sometimes, though, it is good to break out of a cycle and do something new, something fresh and something just slightly uncomfortable....

That's where we are as Cornerstone: we have established the new church, and we have celebrated our first birthday with a great concert, and now we must continue on this path of discovery for our future with God. Things are changing, shifting, and not all of us are entirely comfortable with change. Hold on, though, to all that God promises us in Christ. Remember that the Israelite army had to walk around Jericho daily for a week, then 7 times on the seventh day before they saw any response to the promise that God would give them Jericho. They had to persevere, trust in the promise, and be patient. They also expected a "battle" but God was fighting that battle on their behalf in a different way — and Cornerstone must also be prepared for God to answer our prayers in unexpected ways.

Just as we look forward to the positives of winter and the new beginnings of spring, we can look forward with confidence in our hearts for the future of Cornerstone: it may not be what we expect, it may not be what we have prayed for, but if we listen well, it will be God's plan – and God's plans always teach us something, change us in some way, and bless us in one way or another.

As we continue to share together in "Your Place at the Table" through the autumn, think about how the "five stones" that we are building our community around (prayer, storytelling, discipleship, authenticity and a single, vibrant and inclusive community) are developing in your own faith story. As we pray together and at

home, in small groups and alone, we can focus on the priorities that the Discerning Prayer Journey identified as our foci for now – prayer, community-facing worship and the further development of the house/small groups.

We can ask ourselves some questions: what is God saying to me about my prayer life? How can we commit to pray as a community? What do we expect from prayer? How does prayer affect me? What do I think about prayer? What are our prayer priorities right now? How can we embed prayer more deeply in our shared life together?

**Storytelling** is about two stories – our story and God's story. We weave together our own faith story with the huge narrative of God's story in the world and our part in it, and we can reflect on how we share those stories with others. How could my story challenge or inspire? How do I react to the stories that are shared by others? What of God's story has impacted me? How can Cornerstone best share God's story? What part of God's story is important to us as Methodists at Cornerstone?

**Discipleship** is a personal question but framed in community life too: how am I following Jesus in my own life? How am I enabling others in their own walk with Jesus? Could I help to disciple someone younger in the faith? What supports me? How do I live out my own discipleship practice — Bible-study, a house group or small group, faithfulness in good stewardship, etc (Check out A Methodist Way of Life again for a reminder).

**Authenticity** is a big challenge to us all: it is the call to let down the front that we put on and be real with one another. Rather than saying "I'm fine" every single time, to occasionally share appropriately how we are really doing. Sharing the realities of this life is important for mission – if the world thinks that all Christians have perfect lives, it gives the wrong impression...... Is our church a safe space for me to really BE me? That's a big question and one which we need to address as a church community. When a faith community is a deeply authentic space, how might that impact our mission for Cornerstone?

A single, vibrant, inclusive community draws many of these threads together and challenges us to draw closer as prayerful disciples and to share deeply in community! Inclusion is a topic which is very broad and covers far more than we think: Inclusive Church talks about disability, economic power, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, learning disability, mental health, neurodiversity, or sexuality. This is a wide range of diversities which we can seek to understand, appreciate and welcome. What does the Cornerstone of the future look like, feel like?

A lot of questions! Personally, we can also reflect more on the questions, "What is ours to do?" and "what should we prioritise for the Kingdom of God?"

I'd love to hear your thoughts on these – either in one of the "Your Place at the Table" sessions, or just drop me an email or catch me sometime!

#### **ZAMBIA**

The United Church of Zambia had a complicated history following the "Copperbelt" mining days of Rhodesia, 100 years ago. The United Church of Zambia was established in 1965 and has continued in fellowship and faithfulness to the Gospel, the Methodist Churches having an important rôle.

In November 2021, our Mission Partner, Gina Oliver was appointed Health Secretary for United Church of Zambia and

works in conjunction with the Zambia Health Ministry. The United Church of Zambia has responsibility for four Methodist Mission hospitals and 7 clinics, all built in the 1960s-1970s across the most deprived regions of Zambia. Medical staff are supported by the Health Ministry but the old, dilapidated buildings and provision of equipment and supplies are the responsibility of the United Church of Zambia , who have very little income when the majority of patients have no money to pay for retreatment or medication (if they are available). These are ongoing challenges for the UCZ who also have to deal with recurring health issues caused by the primitive sanitary facilities and unreliable water supplies alongside the "rural access" roads that are often impassable.

Gina is Zambian by birth and Malcom spent many years in Zambia prior to their ministry in the UK. Now he supports Gina and the United Church of Zambia in many practical ways as an Accompanying Volunteer for Methodist World Mission .

Ida and Keith Waddell have been our Methodist World Mission members since 2004, serving at Mwandi Methodist Mission station. Mwandi is where Dr. David Livingstone lived, by the Zambezi River, when he was exploring to find the source of the river Nile. In 2015, Keith and Ida moved to Lusaka when Ida was appointed as Health Secretary for United Church of Zambia, until Gina took on this rôle. Then they returned to their home (self-built!) in Mwandi where they have devoted the last 4 years to repairs and equipment for hospital and care for the staff, at the same time partnering Gina and Malcom to improve the health care in the United Church of Zambia hospitals and clinics.

Keith uses his knowledge and skills to introduce income generating projects like live-stock and chicken husbandry plus fish-rearing ponds. Charcoal briquettes are made from waste materials and a brick making kiln to use locally available supplies for building blocks. All these projects provide employment with training and a regular income for local families and are underpinned by daily prayers and bible teaching for the workers, led by Keith.

providing a safe place for their children to have a good education. Aided by Zoom Ida occasionally connects with a teacher from her home church in Scotland who leads Teacher Training sessions with the Zambian teachers, to enhance the basic principles they teach by, which are quite formal and repetitive. Donors from Scotland also supplied toys and sport equipment and outdoor playground items to encourage play and teamwork. Family life improves when parents have employment, greater food security, education and health advice resulting in a sense of hope and wellbeing.

Ida devotes a lot of her time to maintain contact with sponsors and donors and find new sources of funds to upgrade the old hospitals and clinics. Mwandi Mission Hospital now has an X-ray unit housed in new premises built using blocks made on site. Supporters have gifted Cervical cancer and breast screening units; Intensive Care Unit *Leadboards* and a suction machine; Oxygen cylinders with an Oxygen producing unit; all of them capable of saving many lives. Ida joins with her staff when they attend training in the use and maintenance of these valuable machines. She also offers a listening ear to anyone who needs a friend to talk to about their problems.

Visitors come for a variety of reasons and receive enthusiastic welcomes. Friends from Ireland have an experimental project to develop paddy fields and grow rice using wastewater from the fishponds. Friends from a church in the USA oversaw the funding and digging of a borehole. Gina and Malcolm challenge members of United Church of Zambia to "get their hands dirty ", visit rural Mission work with projects. Members of a choir in one of the Lusaka churches went to Mwandi prepared to build a home for a homeless mother and 5 small children. Gina arranges fundraising events and obtains grants for Mission Hospitals including Mberishi, where buildings were unsafe and all equipment obsolete; Lubwa where termites have eaten the foundations of building structures. Many have serious troubles with sporadic water supply and electricity.

Ida and Keith made a short visit to their large family in the UK last year to be with Keith's father for a few hours before he died, meet their 8<sup>th</sup> grandchild of 2 days old and attend a wedding. A short time of mixed emotions before returning to their Zambian family, Ellie who attends Secondary boarding school in Livingstone and Mubita who lives in their Mwandi home. During Christmas, last year, Keith believed God was saying to him , I AM EMMANUEL (God with us) to share all the chaos and suffering by His own death and resurrection.

They enjoyed a short respite to attend a United Church of Zambia conference where they camped on the flood plains of the Zambezi. The Synod Bishop introduced them to King Lubosi of Barotseland who was there as Guest of Honour. Our 4 Mission Partners are encouraged to know that we support them in prayer on DAY 7 each month.

# METHODIST STATIONING

# DORKING & HORSHAM METHODIST CIRCUIT 36/10 STATIONING 2025 UPDATE

Dear Friends,

The Connexional Year marks my final year of Circuit Ministry in the Methodist Church of Great Britain. I can't quite believe I have arrived at this point in my journey. It certainly has taken Angela and I, along with our family, to unexpected places and left us with a hoard of memories to treasure and ponder in the years to come.

The process of drawing it all to a conclusion began with my request to end my appointment as Superintendent Minister in the Dorking & Horsham Circuit to an early end by one year as of the  $31^{\rm st}$  August 2025. The Circuit Invitation Committee granted my request which was approved by the Circuit Meeting of the  $12^{\rm th}$  September 2024. All of that means that we are heading into the Stationing Rounds set to unfold in the coming months.

Once the Circuit is aware of the need to enter stationing, a conversation unfolds with the District Chair and Lay Stationing Representative and the Circuit Leadership Team have prepared a Circuit Profile describing the appointment and the kind of minister we hope to attract to this appointment. This process has been completed and the District Chair and Lay Stationing Representative have both commended us on the profile that has been prepared.

The appointment is to serve as Superintendent and that aspect of the profile has an additional element to it. We are currently entering into a period of consultation with our eastern neighbours, the Redhill & East Grinstead Circuit, with a view to creating a new Circuit formed out of the two existing Circuits. Because the Superintendent of that Circuit is also considering a change in the more immediate future, and to give more weight to this appointment, it is intended that this person will be appointed as the Superintendent to the newly formed Circuit. The new Circuit will comprise of nine churches together with the Dorking Christian Centre and will have five full time ministers and one two thirds minister on the staff team. There is also a full time minister serving as a Prison Chaplain and Take Time co-ordinator in the other Circuit as well.

# METHODIST STATIONING

What happens next is that, in October, the Circuit will be sent a book of Profiles of all the ministers on the move. We will explore them and give the District Chair our five most desired prospects. The Chair and Lay Representative will take those to the Connexional Stationing Committee in late October and, together with the representatives from the other twenty three Districts, they endeavour to match ministers with appointments across the Connexion. It needs to be noted that there are generally more appointments than there are ministers available to fill them. I'm not sure what the ratio is this year but it won't be small.

If we have a match in this first round of stationing, then we will get to meet the prospective candidate in early November. Given that it is a Superintendency, they will not only have a conversation with us here at Cornerstone, but also the other parts of the Circuit as well as with our neighbours. If all those conversations go well and we and the minister feel right about each other, the job will be done! An invitation will be issued and accepted, hopefully, and we can get on with life until their arrival in the summer of next year.

If that is not the outcome of the process or, if we don't get matched with anyone in the first round, there is another Stationing round in January and the whole process happens all over again!

Even if we are not successful at that point, the process continues in the background right up until Conference next year and, as you may well remember, we appeared at that point the previous time the Circuit was in Stationing for a Superintendent minister.

Please do keep us all and this whole process in your prayers over the coming months. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask. I will be only too glad of the opportunity to help provide any answers I can.





didn't fit in at school. I was one of those kids who was singled out by other pupils and made to feel like an outsider.

At the same time, I was starting to question whether or not God was real. As a Methodist minister's son, I'd been brought up to believe in God. But, as I journeyed closer to adult independence, I knew I needed to make up my own mind.

Wanting to rebel against my Christian upbringing, I found myself rejecting faith and religion for a while. Feeling outcast and alone, I started listening to heavy metal music. This led me to discover a geographically dispersed community of music-lovers who placed an emphasis on being different, so I felt at home with them.

#### Commitment

Eventually, I made a faith commitment and decided to dedicate my life to God – hence I've been a Methodist minister since 2013. But that didn't mean I stopped enjoying listening to heavy metal.

When it comes to culture and faith, I believe the Methodist Church is well placed to say "ves" to both rather than "either or".

People who aren't very familiar with metal music probably think all the songs are about darkness and evil, but there are good and bad elements in every sub-culture. As with everything, we must exercise discernment. While there are some bands that claim to be satanic, a lot of metal music draws upon biblical imagery and is about battling evil and searching for goodness. There's even a handful of UK Christian metal bands.

While on a sabbatical in 2021, I was reading about aspects of Western culture, including metal music. I thought to myself "God has given us the gift of music and we should celebrate it and use it for good, recognising that God can speak through any genre."

#### Online prayer

Soon afterwards, I was leading some online prayer meetings and began thinking about how I could use the internet to connect metal music fans with the gospel.

In 2022, the then Youth President of the Methodist Church, James Carver, encouraged me to develop my ideas. So, towards the end of that year, I formally launched Metal Methodist – an online faith space aimed at metal enthusiasts.



A few people joined the first livestreamed event, so I was encouraged to continue. Some of those original participants were from my local Methodist circuit, while others lived further afield. One of them later told me they'd grown up as part of a church but had decided, earlier on the day of the livestream, to call it quits with religion. They had then seen a Facebook post about the event and decided to give it one last go. They have since remained part of our congregation, been baptised and become a member of the Methodist Church!

The growing number of people engaging with Metal Methodist, which now includes livestreamed face-to-face gatherings, are a mix of atheists who visit for the interviews with musicians, people open to learning about Christianity, people seeking a relationship with God, and Christians who feel they don't fit into a traditional church environment.

#### Welcoming

I think people connect with a welcome that's for everyone and recognises that God can speak to people in all kinds of ways, including through heavy metal. It's vital that metal fans know that they don't need to change their music or aesthetic to be a Christian.

I'm thrilled that, for the second year running, I'll be taking the essence of Metal Methodist to 3Generate, the Church's national event for young people, at Birmingham NEC from 4 to 6 October.

There may be young people out there who are struggling to find a sense of belonging. Some may be carrying heavy burdens, so it's my aim to provide a space at 3Generate where they can talk to God about their troubles, consider how they could ask people they trust for help, and hear that they're not alone. 




