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A Word from one of our Ministers

Dear Friends.

November is upon us and with it Remembrance Sunday which often includes the following familiar words:

'When You Go Home, Tell Them Of Us And Say, For Your Tomorrow, We Gave Our Today.'

The Kohimah Epitaph. I did a little digging and found out some interesting facts about the epitaph. It derives from North East India where it is engraved on the Memorial of the 2nd British Division in the cemetery of Kohima. It is attributed to John Maxwell Edmonds (1875-1958), and is thought to have been inspired by the epitaph written by Simonides of Ceos to honour the Greeks who fell at the Battle of Thermopylae in 480BC. It is a World War II War Cemeterv.

Kohima is where the Japanese advance was halted and the cemetery is a memorial to the 1,420 soldiers, including 917 Sikh and Hindu combatants, who gave their all for our tomorrow.

This year as we approach this special day I find myself in desperate anguish over the senseless destruction of lives and livelihoods we witness on a daily basis in our lounges as fighting and conflict rages all over the globe. I don't know about you, but I can't bear to look anymore. I wonder what the fallen of World War II might have to say to us today?

Why are we so powerless at preventing this? Why are we so quick to strike or strike back? Why does fear – fear for our safety, fear of deprivation, fear of the other, fear of some ill defined loss – drive us so inexplicably into destructive behaviour that turns cities into rubble and indiscriminately maims and kills human life without a second glance never mind thought?

I wonder if it might just be that at the heart of our faith lies an event that we might have just maybe misread?

The Cross.

The accepted wisdom, for the most part, is that the Cross is God's way of dealing with our sin, our brokenness. God, who cannot bear to look upon sin, smites God's only Son in order to assuage God's wrath at our wilful disobedience. Jesus is the sacrificial Lamb who pays the price for our wrongdoing in his own blood and the deed is done. Even the sacrificial lambs slain in the Temple had a more dignified end than Jesus did.

If this is sanctioned violence in the full glare of the public eye then it is no wonder we have not found another way to deal with our disagreements and differences of opinion.

Here's the what if - the other way of looking at the cross.

What if the Cross is not God's idea but ours? What if Jesus' death is not demanded by God, but by us? After all, who was it that stood baying for that outcome before Pilate that fateful day? It wasn't God, it was us! We do that. Something beautiful, something different, someone who challenges our small thinking comes along and demonstrates, in all its beauty and glory what humanity is meant to be and we can't stand the contradiction so we do the only thing we know how – we obliterate it.

That, I put to you, is the reason Jesus died. We couldn't stand the contradiction. The challenge was just too great. It had to be done away with.

Richard Rohr, Brian McLaren and others have described Jesus death on the cross as the greatest act of non-violent love ever witnessed. The greatest act of non-violent love. Jesus does not lift a finger to defend himself even though he could have. Why?

Because the ultimate lesson of the Cross is simply this: Love NEVER dies!

So, what if that becomes the narrative rather than the previous one? Maybe, just maybe, I think, we'll find the answer we've been searching for.





Every November, Christians around the world come together to pray for the persecuted Church for the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church (IDOP). This year that time falls on Sunday 3 November. We believe in the power of prayer to bring about change, knowing that where two or three are gathered, our Lord is in the midst.


Religious buildings are being destroyed. Leaders are imprisoned and even tortured. For some, just attending a service can be a deadly risk. And yet, when we go to church, or gather with friends to pray, it can be hard to imagine the dangers others face in order to do the same things as us.

You can join us online for the annual IDOP virtual event. This year, we will be sharing about one of the most closed, isolated, and repressive states in the world: North Korea.

Almost a year ago, credible reports emerged that over 500 North Korean refugees had been forcibly repatriated to North Korea from China. Most were civilians and many held religious beliefs. Those returned to North Korea frequently face torture, imprisonment, and in some cases even public execution. Those found to have had contact with Christians are known to face particularly harsh punishment.

Praying for North Korea can sometimes feel impossible, given the gravity of the widespread human rights violations in the country. But we believe in a God who can move mountains, part oceans and — even more incredibly — move human hearts.

Tanzania



In September 'Outlook' we were reminded of Disability Awareness Day and the compassion of Jesus who never turned away from anyone who came to Him in their desperate situations. In some countries, people with disabilities are given generous support which enables them to live a full life and even take part in challenging events like Marathons or Paralympics.

Sadly, disabled people in other countries have no recognition, but they are known by God who has inspired "ordinary" people to raise awareness of specific disabilities and work to develop a cure or treatment and make them available where there is no doctor. Suffering is made more acute by the effects of climate change or conflict plus the belief that disabilities are the result of a curse and people are either hidden away or abandoned by their families.

Christian missions, churches and charities are now working together to find these hidden treasures. Some hospitals train clinicians, preparing them to set up basic health centres in isolated places. Their training prepares them to diagnose and treat common illnesses and arrange for those with complicated conditions to see doctors. Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) was founded in the late 1940s (about the same time as the Flying Doctor Service in East Africa) and pilots fly their small planes in countries where roads are either impassable, dangerous, or non-existent. They can take a team of Eye Doctors to a clinic where many people have sight loss with equipment for a "pop-up" theatre. Within a few days, hundreds of patients have surgery for cataracts and other infections and causes of sight loss, providing glasses when needed. Other doctors were able to treat fistulas and conditions that rob women of their dignity. Planes can carry crutches, splints and even wheelchairs, designed for use on the rough tracks and footpaths around people's homes. Local people have the responsibility of preparing and maintaining the runway. All teams include an evangelist, who assists pastors who faithfully preach to the patients and their families during the time they are waiting for or recovering from treatment. Flights are arranged for patients who need urgent hospital treatment. In many ways God's inclusive love is shown to people who may feel forgotten.

In last winter's issue of Connection, Re. Andrew Ashdown reported on his visit to the Methodist Churches in North West Tanzania. He accompanied Rev. Peter Kasulu on visits to some of the 50 churches in his widespread circuit (not all have buildings!). Rev. Ashdown met several disabled people whoa have received a "seed grant" donated by the British Methodist Mission Fund. This fund helps Rev. Kasulu to

follow in the footsteps of Jesus. LUKE 4 v18-19; MATTHEW 25 v37-40. He and members of the churches welcome all people, and healing can begin as soon as people with disabilities find they are accepted and valued just as they are. The grant enables training in simple skills and tools appropriate for each individual. Attitudes towards them from their families and community have transformed their prospects and given them self-worth.

By providing Pascal with a "seed grant" and crutches he now supports his family by rearing chickens. Antonia has a daughter who is deaf and mentally disturbed, and she invested her grant into buying and then selling maize – the staple diet for most people. Hopefully this income will allow her daughter to see a doctor. Mayako sells sugar cane and with the profit he brought 7 chickens. He says, "people now treat me with respect now that I can feed and support myself". With the added support of her church friends Laurencia has a micro-business producing and selling charcoal. Mariam, who walks 10km to church and back for Sunday services, also has a more hopeful future with her growing charcoal producing project. Victor is able to attend the local primary school now that he has a wheelchair, and his parents are using their seed grant to grow enough funds for Victor to progress to secondary school in a few years. Esther has 5 children and 4 of them are disabled by an inherited condition. Her husband abandoned them, believing them to be cursed. Without the church's help they would have become homeless. Her "seed grant" has enabled her to set up a market stall selling maize, charcoal and bananas. Daniel suffered with TB when he was 12 years old leaving him disabled but he learnt how to repair things. His seed grant allowed him to purchase tools and set up a repair stall at the market and also construct his own small home to live in independently. Jennifer spent many weeks in hospital after a riot erupted near her market stall and she was injured by a stray bullet. Support from her church and a "seed grant" has enabled her to recover and care for her children again.

These, and many others, convey their gratitude to U.K. Methodists, and the Rev. Ashdown reports that there is a widespread need to expand this ministry. We can remember Rev. Peter Kasulu when we pray for the people of Tanzania on DAY 8 in our Prayer Handbook.

"Think before you throw" or Tips from the Tip



"You're taking Mum out for a trip to the tip and Ford prison? My word, you do live life..." remarked my daughter on hearing that the Traveller's house group were to visit the Ford Materials Recycling Centre (MRF) near Arundel, followed by lunch at HM Prison (their café is called "Serving Thyme").

There are about 400,000 households in West Sussex and the county council operating through Biffa, the waste management company, collects around 370,000 tonnes of material from us each year. Some 84,000 comes from the local recycling centres like Hop Oast in Horsham, the rest is kerb-side collections from our blue bins. West Sussex recycles 53.7% of all waste, which is higher than many local authorities (we are 37th in the rankings) but we can't be complacent. Dressed in yellow flak-jackets and red hard-hats, our group enjoyed a factcrammed presentation in the MRF's education unit, followed by a visit to the facility itself. Surprisingly noisy, fairly dusty but with little odour, this is a fascinating piece of engineering. You are amazed by the size and ingenuity of the multiple devices (mechanical, electrical, magnetic, air-blown) all connected by conveyor belts that sort the waste, going into a funnel at one end, into neatly packaged bundles at the other end – all ready for despatch to other plants for reprocessing, re-manufacturing or export. Laid out on one level, the machinery would be as long as a football pitch but the engineers have folded it so it all fits into a relatively small warehouse building.

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The MRF is a commercial operation. The products are segregated into different streams for selling on to more specialist recycling operators. Speed is of the essence. Cross-contamination of streams (e.g. mixing metal with cardboard or putting old VHS tapes in with other plastics) can cause machinery to stop and require cleaning or repair – leading to higher costs.

It's very important that we pre-sort and prepare our own waste properly. It's better if we squeeze empty plastic bottles and put the lid back on. The semi-flattened bottles are easier to detect at the MRF as a result. Make sure we don't dispose of lithium batteries carelessly (even discarded single-use vapes have them) and it's a fire hazard. Make sure cardboard is dry when you bin it as wet cardboard can foul up the machinery. Roll up scraps of silver foil into balls and put as much aluminium into waste as possible – it's very valuable as is the copper, silver, gold and other metals which can be recovered from small electrical appliances.

West Sussex CC are running an awareness campaign "Think before you throw" in schools and for the general public and we all need reminders of where we can safely dispose of items. Did you know that any shop selling batteries is legally required to collect old ones?

Our thanks to Gill Scott for organising the trip, which we all enjoyed and the café is to be recommended too – good food, reasonably priced.




