A Word from one of our Ministers

Dear Friends,

As I sit to write this column we are a couple of days away from a very significant General Church Meeting. I am not here going to guess the outcome of that meeting or even suggest what I believe it should be. What I do wish to do, though, is share some thoughts that have come to me in the build up to our meeting.

Saturday past, 18<sup>th</sup> January, the reflection we used for Prayer Partners focused on the wedding in Cana, of Galilee, in John Chapter 2. In John's list of 'signs', as he calls them, this is the first 'act of power' Jesus performed. You will remember he turned the water into wine! Not just any wine, mind you. No, according to the Steward of the festivities, it was the best he'd ever tasted!

A rather odd way to demonstrate your power, don't you think? It's a bit excessive, isn't it, turning around 180 gallons of water into wine! And, that's after who knows how much everyone already has had to drink!

Think about that for a minute.

Here's a celebration of life and love and everything good and filled with hope about to run aground because someone got the calculation wrong regarding the provision of the wine. In a culture driven by hospitality an acute embarrassment was being stared in the face. This is going to be the wedding remembered, not for the beauty of the bride or the handsomeness of the groom. Nor the joy ceremony and the celebration of life it was. No, it was going to be remembered as the one where the wine ran out before the party had even really got started! Well, Jesus had something to say about that – or at least his Mother did! Jesus, in deference to her, simply made it all happen!

My question simply is what's the water in your life and mine, in our life together, we need Jesus to turn into the wine of celebration and new life?

Notice, though, that the answer to that question involves us in doing something. Something quite ridiculous, in fact. The servant was instructed to simply draw some water out of the jar and take it to the Steward. Really? Go give him some water to drink! Think I'll take a helmet with me because I know what's going to happen next! Oh! Hey, what now?!

Yes, imagine the surprise, the astonishment! Imagine the servant running back to the jar to go and see what has happened. Imagine the joy, and relief. Imagine the party that followed!

Imagine!



### **Stationing Announcement**

The Dorking & Horsham Circuit are pleased to announce that the Reverend Tony Cavanagh and his wife Mandy have accepted the invitation extended to them by the Dorking & Horsham Circuit Invitation Committee to become Superintendent Minister with Pastoral Charge of the Cornerstone Methodist Church in our Circuit. Tony will commence his appointment on the 1st September 2025.

This appointment includes the possibility of being appointed the Superintendent of the New Circuit that we are hoping will emerge from the conversations currently under way between the two Circuits *[Dorking and Horsham Circuit and Redhill and East Grinstead Circuit]*. Should that outcome be a positive one, Tony is prepared to become the Superintendent for the New Circuit and both Circuit Invitation Committees support that outcome.



Reverend Tony Cavanagh will be joining us from Poole Bay Methodist Circuit Bournemouth where he is Superintendent Minister. He joined Poole Bay Methodist Circuit in September 2012 having previously been Superintendent of the former Hemel Hempstead and Berkhamsted Circuit. Originally from Newcastle Upon Tyne, he moved down South in 1986. He is married to Mandy, who is a Primary School Teacher. They have three children – Tom, Jacob and Josh.

#### A testimony from Jenny Jackson

My early memories of church recall me to a dark, dismal place for solemn people called Christians. I was taught that Jesus only loved children, and I remember trying so hard because I wanted Him to love me. When I was 6 years old, my father joined the RAF and the following year, my mother took my brother and I to live in S E Devon, in railway carriages which had previously been holiday accommodation for all our relatives. The freedom of this simple life and the friendship of country folk (who never went to church, because there was not one) released me from the fear of not being good enough for God.

The unfolding beauty of His creation all around me drew out such a strong response of thankfulness that it seemed as if I was talking to Him – a natural way to pray. I began to trust Him as I learnt more about His love for me, even when I was not always good. I accepted Jesus as my Saviour, but I did not want to be identified as a Christian.

However, we could not remain in Devon forever and just as I reached my teens, we moved to Horsham. That meant Sundays in church again, but it was not so bad after all. It became routine and by the time we and our friends had our own families, life seemed to revolve around Church activities.

I was middle-aged when I was challenged by the question, "You believe you are a Christian, but are you a disciple?" Well! I knew Jesus had disciples who followed Him around and sat on hillsides while He taught them how to obey God's laws and live in the way that pleased Him. I had thought I knew it all.

As I pondered the question and read the Bible for answers, I realised that disciples are students learning from their master. Jesus was training them to continue His work on earth after His death and resurrection. My childhood faith was just the beginning and needed to be built on.

So, this past 40 years of learning have revealed God's inclusive love for all people who dwell on this wonderful earth He created. He trusts His disciples to be good stewards.

I enjoy the fellowship (i.e. friendship) of others at church on Sunday mornings and usually learn fresh truths about God as we listen and pray together.



### UGANDA



In a recent newsletter from Daniel, our mission partner in Uganda, he was reflecting on how complicated it has become for the majority of Ugandan Church Leaders to access any Theological education in languages they can understand. Daniel had been reading about John Wesley's men described as ....

"normal. people, some unable to read or write but all were given the chance when filled with the Holy Spirit, to proclaim the Good News and build up the Kingdom of God "

Two thousand years ago this could have described those men who spent 3 years with Jesus as He prepared them to become Apostles to continue His ministry after His Ascension to Glory. As promised, they received the gift of the Holy Spirit and followed His command to take the Gospel message all over the world. Like Wesley's men, they could not keep the Good News to themselves.

After Saul's (Paul's) dramatic conversion, he spent 3 years with the Believers and Leaders in Damascus, learning the truth about the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, before being sent on Missionary journeys, in the company of another Leader and a younger trainee who could be left in ministry with new churches and continue a correspondence course with Paul. We have his letters to Timothy and others in our New Testaments.

In many nations, even now, Pastors lead similar lives to Wesley's men e.g. An ordained Minister in Zambia serves a circuit area with a radius of 80kms, where he walks between his 50 congregations (approx. 15 thousand members) on a regular basis. The training and teaching for those he appoints to lead churches for most of the year, will only be from his own understanding and hopefully he can supply them with a Bible in their language.

The Centre for the Study of Global Christianity estimates that 85% of Evangelical Church Leaders in Africa alone, have little or no understanding of the Bible. This has not hindered the rapid growth of the Church among nations in the Southern hemisphere. Linguists and Translators have painstakingly made God's word available in the world's major languages. MWM and other denominations opened

Theological Colleges and these have produced dedicated Leaders. There are now Methodist Bishops all over the world. Former student and Theologian, Bishop Philip, in Tanzania has said "Rooted in Christ I have gone about my life and ministry, whether that has been discipling my family, training students at college or with the 110 Churches in my diocese."

Theological Education by Extension TEE has been developed as an alternative resource for Pastors without complete education to be included. Atypical Bible College syllabus is adapted for a Lecturer to teach theses isolated Leaders in their home district. TEE reduces feelings of loneliness as there are opportunities for group discussion and prayer in addition to Bible study. After a week or two, students understand how to study the Bible for themselves and explain the message with greater assurance in their churches. This 'small group' training continues for about 3 years, without Pastors having to leave their families and with minimal expense.

The rapid advance of modern technology during recent years has impacted the Global Church in the 65% of the world where internet is available. Last year the ALL AFRICA TEE conference was held at the college in Kigali , Rwanda, where our MWM partner, Wendy, has lectured. It was agreed to adopt the on-line TEE model developed by the United Church of Zambia which addresses issues such as HIV/AIDS, gender based violence and climate change. TEE expands the Pastor's knowledge of all the Bible teaches about God's heart of love for mission in the world. The task of Bible translation has gathered speed and the Bible Society reports there are now printed Bibles in 700 languages. Christian radio broadcasts now have the capacity to reach most places where solar powered radios are available.

Worldwide there are many schools and colleges without the funds to buy computers or any IT items. Internet Cafes are well used in urban locations. A Methodist Church in a small town in the vast desert area of western South Africa has equipped an unused building into an IT Café. Students receive training and can then improve their education, learn skills to start a small business and teach others, and Church Leaders can gather for TEE on-line sessions. Rachel, our MWM member who teaches Theology at a Bible College in Sierra Leone, has arranged a partnership between this less well equipped College in Freetown and Cliff College near Derby. This is known as Theology X and encourages a cross-culture experience.

New members are very welcome to join us - we start each session with a light lunch and catch-up chat where we get to know one another better, then we break out the church's "Conversations Against Mundanity" card packs as the launch point of our debates. As we share our individual interests and points of view, we often discover new and unusual outlooks on social issues. We gently come to a better understanding of ourselves and others as we explore memorable experiences from our own lives, applying different perspectives to them in a supportive and non-judgmental space.

Over the course of our first two terms we've learnt about one person's near-death experience and another's encounter with an angel. We've contemplated what role some of our earliest memories have played in shaping our personalities. We've considered whether time travel might ever be possible. We've put the world to rights in a dozen different ways when asked what one change we'd make to society, if that change could be guaranteed to succeed. Off the back of that we've shared recipes and book recommendations, and delved into the wisdom of great thinkers - from Douglas Adams to Mother Teresa. On the flip-side of the cards, we've also debated whether ham and pineapple on pizza should be declared a crime against humanity!

### Holocaust Memorial Day held on 27<sup>th</sup> January 2025



The Holocaust Memorial Day Trust encourages remembrance in a world scarred by prejudice and systematic, targeted persecution. We promoted and supported Holocaust Memorial Day – the international day on 27 January. The Holocaust is central to Holocaust Memorial Day and we remember the 6 million Jews murdered during the Holocaust. We also commemorated the millions more people murdered through the Nazi persecution of other groups and in the more recent genocides recognised by the UK government, and the genocide in Darfur.

This Holocaust Memorial Day marked the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration camp complex, and the 30th anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia.

The Holocaust threatened the fabric of civilisation, and discrimination and persecution must still be resisted every day. Our world often feels fragile and vulnerable and we cannot be complacent. Wherever it takes place, including in the UK, prejudice and the language of hatred must be challenged by us all.

Together we bear witness for communities who suffered attempted annihilation, and honour the survivors and all those whose lives were changed beyond recognition.

#### What can we do?

Today, the language of division, fear and prejudice is all too common – both online and in person around the UK. Police figures from England and Wales show hate crimes have risen year on year, and organisations such as the Community Security Trust and Tell MAMA continue to document rising antisemitism (anti-Jewish hatred) and anti-Muslim hatred.

Anti-Gypsy, Roma and Traveller attitudes are prevalent, and members of the LGBTQI+ community continue to face hostile environments. Sexism, ageism, racism and disability discrimination are all forms of identity-based prejudice which need to be challenged.

We all have the power to make changes and take action to support those who face discrimination. From educating ourselves to better understand those who we perceive as different, to reporting hate crime if we see it, there are actions we can and must take to make our communities safer.





### **Racial Justice Sunday**

#### **9th February**

The new Morrison shop at the corner of Springfield Road and London Road has made me recall memories of my youth. (No comments please).



In the late 1950's whilst still at school, I used to try and find a job during the holidays to pass the time and earn a little pocket money. One year a neighbour of my parents suggested I could help our at a grocers in Bradford where their son had helped. I went for an interview at the Bradford shop and was taken on. I initially worked in that shop, a business owner by Hilda, the wife of William who had recently passed away; she was a bit of a dragon, and managed the market stall in nearby Rawson Market. Because I was young I was sent down the road with the extra goods she was running short of. Although she swore like a trooper to the other older staff, I was not sworn at and she was very nice to me. Hilda left the running of the business in the hands of her son Ken.

The company had been founded in 1899 initially as an egg and butter merchant in Bradford. When Ken took over in 1952, he was soon joined by brothers-in-law Ken Blundell and Keith Naylor . (*It was Ken Blundell that interviewed me*).

I moved from the shop to a wooden warehouse in Thornton Road, Bradford, where we took in all the commercial deliveries and from where we delivered to the shops in Bradford and Leeds.

It was a back breaking task stacking all the boxes manually. Sometimes deliveries to the warehouse were late arriving and we had to work until the task had been completed. On a few occasions Ken called in and helped us unload and stack the large boxes of tins, bottles etc. enthusiastically climbing up the stacks of boxes with sleeves rolled up.

It was on one of these occasions that Ken offered to give me a lift home and, as we left the warehouse, he pointed to the old Victoria cinema just a short distance away and said that he had bought it and was going to turn it into a supermarket. I remember very clearly asking him " what is a supermarket ? ". There weren't any supermarkets, as such, in those days. So, in 1956 Morrisons opened their first supermarket "Victoria" in Thornton Road, Bradford.



Ken, a modest man, always refused to take credit for the company's success over the years and, in 1967, changed its name to -Wm Morrison Supermarkets Ltd.
